## Audit of Emerging Infections Review process

We invited the Government Internal Audit Agency to review our EIR processes, which concluded: “The approach for horizon scanning to identify and respond to emerging (and re-emerging) infections remains robust, reliable, and continues to evolve in line with best practice... The team effectively identify; assess; escalate; and communicate risks to blood and tissue safety, earning high levels of stakeholder confidence in both the process and its outputs.”
