- Throughout history, children were seen as the property of its parents which they could do with as they pleased.¹
 - Today, the role of parent or guardian is to act as trustee of the child and safeguard their rights and interests until the child can decide for themselves.²

Valid consent for blood transfusion should be obtained and documented in the patient's clinical record by the healthcare professional

What is meant by **valid** consent?















How can we obtain valid consent?

....we can't ask the patient!















Valid consent....

- As with adults, consent should be seen as a process, rather than a one off event
- Where possible, time should be provided to consider the risks and benefits















Because life is rarely straightforward...

- What about parents who do not agree with each other?
- What about when the health care professionals and the parents do not agree?
- What about refusal of treatment?
- What about when the parents are children themselves?















Neonatal Transfusions

- Patient lacks capacity!
- Anxiety for parents

(Stressed, new and difficult environment, totally overwhelmed)

- Understanding risk
- Urgency of Transfusion
- Terminology/ concurrent treatments
- Parental responsibility







Documentation...as important as ever!

Retrospective consent....

- We should also inform parents when their baby has been transfused in an emergency situation
- This is known as retrospective 'consent'
